The American Diabetes Association



Over 568,000 people in Maryland have been diagnosed with diabetes and an additional 1.6 million are prediabetic

with blood glucose levels higher than normal. There are also over 140,000 who have diabetes without realizing their condition. Serious complications from diabetes include heart disease, stroke, amputations, blindness, and even death.

Hundreds of thousands of American Diabetes Association (ADA) volunteers are making a difference through community outreach and advocacy.
