Youth Reading to our Veterans & Veterans Reading to Youth:

A Galactic Adventure

In a galaxy not so far away, young Padawans and wise Jedi Masters come together to share the power of knowledge and the joy of reading.

- Host a day of reading at your Jedi Temple (VFW Post), local park, or visit a school. Did you know that National Read a Book Day is celebrated on September 6th across the galaxy?
- Did you know that Read Across America is celebrated on March 2nd? Join forces with fellow readers to explore new worlds and adventures.
- Utilize the list of patriotic books found in the Jedi Archives under Member Resources, under Youth Activities. These books will inspire and ignite the spirit of the Force within you.
- Create a Jedi Library to always have on hand. When your Jedi Temple hosts familystyle meals where younglings might be present, use those books to set up an area where children and Jedi Masters can read to one another.



Where to get the books?

- Check out your local thrift stores, yard sales, flea markets. Most of the time if you explain what you plan on doing with the books, people are more likely to give you a discount or they will donate it to you for free.
- Check out your local library and see if they have them in stock. If they do not see if your Auxiliary can donate some books off the list to the local library.

R.A.P. Cards (Random Act of Patriotism)

Praise the youth for doing a good job. Recognize them by giving them a card and explain why they are receiving it.

National is looking for the most outstanding activity and/or event of YOUTH READING TO VETERANS AND/OR VETERANS READING TO YOUTH.



10 Tips for Working with Youth

When working with youth, it is important to consider their safety and needs. We would like to offer these tips and resources so that you can make sure that all youth you encounter have the best experience possible.



- FOR UNCOMMON HEROES
- Consider taking Youth Protection training. Many organizations working with youth provide and require training. One of the best known is done by Boy Scouts. You do not need to be a member or even involved with the program in order to take their free online training. Find it here: <u>http://www.scouting.org/Training/youthprotection.aspx</u>
- 2. Always respect the time commitments of youth. They are very busy. Be clear about when an event or project starts and how long it will go for. Parents also very much appreciate it when their child is finished at the stated time.
- 3. Parents should always be welcome to stay and take part in the activity.
- 4. No matter the project or event, make sure that proper safety measures are taken for everyone involved. Also, be sure that activities or projects are age appropriate.
- 5. Be extremely conscious of the location where you bring or meet the youths.
- 6. Do not smoke, drink or use drugs around them.
- 7. If you are taking youth somewhere other than the Post home or a school, consider getting permission slips from every parent, and make sure the parents understand that the children may be riding in personal vehicles.
- 8. Receive training from your local Child Abuse Prevention Council or Child Protective Center on the Mandated Suspected Child Abuse Reporting Laws in your State for those working with children.
- 9. Find out if you need to have individuals working with youth/children fingerprinted before working with youth. There may be laws in your state.
- 10. Maintain and model healthy boundaries with children be a role model. Remember it is never appropriate to displays acts of violence or abuse around or towards children.

Remember that it only takes a minute to make a difference in the life of a child. There are lots of small, positive things we can all do to help protect and nurture our children that only take a minute. A few words of praise and encouragement to a child, listening carefully to what a child has to say, showing a child you care, all are simple actions that added together have been shown to have a profound impact on a child's life. In these very real ways, we can all support children and strengthen families.

Involve youth in ALL Auxiliary Programs!

- Marching in Patriotic Holiday Parades.
- Help veterans, service members and their families with yard work or household repairs.
- Sending cards or small gifts to the VFW National home to support families.
- Planning card and letter writing events to send mail to our troops overseas or veterans in VA facilities.
